**WHAT IS GOOD SIGHT ?**



This is a pertinent question, and one which is well worth giving a little thought to occasionally, and I will endeavour to answer it. Owing to the natural power of accommodation of the eye by means of which we see at varying distances, considerable defects may exist without the person being aware of them, except that they may be suggested by many of the symptoms, such as headache, neuralgic pains, etc. There is no cure, however, for neglect when the defect is actually apparent, and if one cannot see as well as one wishes at long distances, or finds any difficulty in reading or doing fine needlework under reasonable conditions, the assistance of spectacles or eyeglasses should at once be resorted to, and in this way the eyes may be preserved in a healthy condition.
